The Avagyans are one of those families who moved to Berdzor in 1997 to populate and strengthen it after Nagorno-Kharabagh conflict. Janik and Khachanush believed that they could have their contribution in the development of the newly born and liberated country; their three sons were also inspired by the same feelings and ideas. Two of their sons have now their own houses and families in Berdzor. Today they live together with the second son's, Romanos's family of seven.

In 2001 Romanos got married and had to move from one place to another in search of better living conditions for his parents and family. In 2011 the local administration of Berdzor provided Romanos Avagyan's family with a house as they were considered an extended family.

The only income of the family comes from beekeeping and farming which is of course not enough to raise five children and rehabilitate the house to have very simple housing conditions with a kitchen, a bathroom and a safe roof.

when their village - Maragha- was invaded by Azeri and up to now it remains under their control.

Ludvig has met his future wife in Berdzor, the latter had moved to Berdzor from the city of Masis, Ararat region, Republic of Armenia .

The family had to earn their living and build a home at the same time. The Khachatryans managed to build two small rooms during the first 4 years, lived there for a while but soon they sold it and left for earning their living abroad. Later in 2010 the couple returned to their homeland. They managed to buy a dilapidated house with only walls built and deteriorated leaking roof.

They renovated the roof with the support of the local municipality. Since then they have been trying to finish the construction but couldn't.

passed through many hardships during the Artsakh Liberation War and lived with the hope to one day see their town rehabilitated, full of life and joy. In 1995, after the war, the family got a deteriorated house without a kitchen, bathroom and other basic necessities. The life in such conditions was not happy and easy at all. The boys were getting older and the family expenses were getting higher and it was getting harder and harder to meet the everyday family needs and to improve the housing conditions at the same time. The rainy autumns and harsh winters made life in the house even more unbearable.

Sargis works as a mechanic at a Road Construction Company, his wife, Armine, works at Kharabagh Telecom as an operator. Their sons have graduated from local school; Tigran, the eldest son, has graduated from Goris branch of State University, the faculty of History; now they both serve in the army.

Somehow Sargis managed to create some simple conditions at home. Each year he was trying to add something to have a place one could call a home, a home he dreamed of when fighting for the liberation of his land.

"At war all of us believed in the bright future, we dreamed how we would promote the country. Many thanks to the generous people for supporting us to overcome the hardships and leave the life full of difficulties far behind. This will be the best gift for my sons. And I am sure their families will be happy here."
